

TOP TIPS TO AVOID NON-CONFORMANCES

We understand that you are passionate about the food you produce and work hard to ensure it is produced to Red Tractor standards. No-one likes a non-conformance, so this flyer sets out top tips for how to avoid the most common non-conformances in the **Red**

Tractor Crops Scheme.

Remember to make use of our templates and checklists which are available online. Seeing this symbol means there is a template available:



1. Is your PPP store of suitable design, construction and layout? Ensure: stores have adequate ventilation, there are warning signs on or adjacent to the door including a general warning sign, no smoking sign and naked flames prohibited sign. A list of emergency contact numbers must be displayed in the store. A first aid kit and fire extinguisher must be available on site too.



2. Is there a Health and Safety Policy in place which is being effectively communicated to workers? Ensure: this is being effectively communicated to all relevant workers and language and learning style is being given due consideration to ensure all workers understand information. The H&S policy is required even if you don't employ staff. Family members and contractors still count as workers.



3. Is PPP application being undertaken by competent operators? Ensure: operators hold the correct NPTC/LANTRA qualifications and are part of a a CPD scheme such as the National Registration of Sprayer Operators (NRoSO). Have the sprayer operator's certificates/cards and NRoSO details to hand to show your assessor.



4. Is there a mass balance in place? Ensure: the estimated quantity of grain and oilseed stored, per site, is recorded immediately post-harvest. Update the mass balance each time grain leaves the farm. When a new harvest starts a reconciliation is carried out and any carry-over grain is transferred to a new mass balance record.



5. Is the documented Crop Contamination Risk Assessment completed? Ensure: possible areas of contamination from physical, chemical, biological and allergen aspects are covered within the risk assessment. Risk assessments include the growing crop, the grain store, the AHDB mycotoxin RA, & CIPC.



6. Is toxic bait being used responsibly? Ensure: non-target animals do not have access to baits and the environmental risk assessment is being undertaken and documented in accordance with the Appendix before bait is laid. Make sure your baiting points are secure and identifiable.



7. Is all PPP application equipment being maintained and tested? Ensure: equipment including a 3m+ boom sprayers, granular nematicide applicators have an annual NSTS test. slug pellet applicators and granular herbicide applicators must have an NSTS test on their 5th birthday and every 6 years thereafter. Handheld knapsack sprayers are receiving an annual on farm self-check and calibration.



8. Is there effective control of vermin? Ensure: a documented site survey is being completed at least quarterly detailing the date of inspection, locations inspected, findings, actions required, and date actions are completed. Ensure there is no build up of vegetation/rubbish around stores that could harbour vermin. Ensure long-term grain stores are well proofed against vermin access.
